Strike Action

- If the unions and government can't agree then the members of the union can vote to strike.
- There are different teaching unions and some of them have voted and decided to strike.

Why are teachers striking?



Teachers salary is effectively less than 23% of what it was in 2010.

The Government want to increase pay by 5%, but the teaching unions believe it should be more.

Also, there is a teacher recruitment and retention crisis. The Unions want the Government to do more to help the Teaching profession

Remember the strike is happening because of a national dispute between the unions and the government and not because of any issues at our Academy




What will happen on Thursday 27th April 2023?







Online learning Support




