What is the 'English Baccalaureate' (Ebacc)?



- The EBacc is made up of the subjects which are considered essential to many degrees and open up lots of doors.
- UCL Institute of Education research shows that studying subjects included in the Ebacc provides students with greater opportunities in further education and increases the likelihood that a student will stay on in full-time education.
- Sutton Trust research reveals that studying the Ebacc can help improve a student performance in English and Maths.
- The government's ambition is to see 90% of students studying the Ebacc subject combination at GCSE by 2025.



How do you qualify for the 'English Baccalaureate' (Ebacc)?

• Studying the EBacc subjects is not compulsory, but it is highly recommended.



BTECs

- Combine practical learning with subject and theory content
- Designed for young people interested in a particular sector or industry but who are not yet sure what job they would like to do.
- Can study a BTEC as a stand-alone course or alongside another academic qualifications e.g. A Levels
- Can study for a BTEC First (like GCSEs) or BTEC National at Level 3 (similar standard to A levels)
- There are over 2,000 BTEC qualifications across 16 sectors
- You will need to check with your local FE / Sixth Form College as to which ones they offer.



T-levels

- Equivalent to 3 A Levels
- Last 2 years and combines classroom learning with on-the-job experience
- Includes a work placement that lasts at least 45 days
- From Autumn 2022 T Levels will be available in;
 Healthcare; Accounting and Finance; Engineering; Management and Administration; Digital Business Services; Education Childcare;
 Digital Production; Onsite Construction
- You will need to check with your local FE College / Training Provider as to which ones they will be offering





A-levels

- Study full time in Sixth Form or FE College
- Usually study 3 to 4 subjects
- Study for 2 years with exams at the end
- There are around 80 different subjects you can study BUT check with the school/college as to what they offer
- You will need at least 5 GCSE's grades 9 to 5 BUT again need to check with the school/college for entry criteria
- After A levels you can progress to University or to an Advanced, Higher or Degree Apprenticeship





Traineeships

- A training programme with work experience
- Can last from 6 weeks to 6 months
- It is a training programme and not a job, so unpaid
- Receive training to prepare you for work, including CV writing and what to expect in the workplace
- Support to improve your English, Maths and Digital Skills if you need it
- Sector focused vocational learning to help prepare you for an apprenticeship or job



Apprenticeships

- A full time job
- Paid
- Training provided free of charge
- Spend 20% of your time away from your desk studying for a qualification and receiving training (i.e. one day a week)
- Different levels depending on what you achieve at GCSE
- Progression routes to higher levels
- Apply to the employer for an Apprenticeship
